Dublin Markets, on Thursday.—We had a very poor supply
of Grain at yesterday's Market; notwithstanding which
there was more than sufficient to meet the demand. Neither
the Distiller nor the Merchant were buying; of course, prices
for Oats and Barley remain nominally the same as those of
last day. Some few parcels of Miller's Wheat were sold at
5s., to 6s.—inferior not in demand. Flour is still dull of
sale, except very coarse Seconds, Thirds, and Fourths—these
descriptions are scarce, and meet a ready sale to the Meal-
men, but not at profitable prices for the Miller.
