STAMP OFFICE, DUBLIN,

THE Commissioners of Stamps hereby give notice in pursuance of the powers vested in them under a certain Act of Parliament, passed in the 5th of his present Majesty's reign, entitled, "An Act to amend the several Stamp Duties in Ireland, and also several other Acts relating to the Collection and Management of said Duties," that they have caused a new, separate, and distinct Stamp to be used and provided, on which the words "Stamp Office" is impressed in order to denote the Stamp which shall be hereafter, from time to time, payable on Releases, Conveyances, or Surrenders of any Offices, or other Deeds, Instruments, or Proceedings whatsoever, (except Indentures of Apprentices to Attorneys, Proctors, and Assignments thereof, and Assignments of the same,) which shall be enrolled of Record in any Courts in the City of Dublin, or in any Courts whatsoever, it having appeared requisite and necessary that the said Commissioners so to do—and that they have caused the Device and Mark heretofore used for any of the said Stamps to be discontinued, and the said new Stamp to be used in lieu thereof. The said Commissioners further give notice that, by the provisions of the said Act any of the said Stamps, which, from and after one month from the date hereof, shall be engrossed, written, or printed on Vellum, Parchment, or Paper, without such Stamp as that provided in the said Act, although the same may have thereon other Stamps or Marks, shall be of no other effect than if the matters had been written or printed upon Vellum, Parchment, or Paper not stamped—and all Persons who shall write or print any Matter on any Vellum, Paper, or Parchment, without such Stamp or Stamps thereon, will incur the same Penalties as they would be liable to, in case the same Matter had been written or printed on Paper, Vellum, or Parchment, not stamped.
