On Friday night a fat sheep was killed on the lands of Milford, the property of George Mansell, Esq. and the carcase taken away.

Two men named Riordan and Houlihan, fishing off Kukee, were upset in a canoe, and both unfortunately drowned.

Saturday, a young man named Heffernan was drowned whilst bathing off the Salmon-weir bank. His body has not yet been found.

Several complaints having been made to the Mayor, of the impropriety and indecency of bathing in the canal, he has directed constables to arrest any person who may attempt such in future, and is determined to punish with the utmost rigour, such as may be brought before him for offending in that way.—The canal, in fact, is the only plea-
