

contradiction of the loss of the Cork Packet, the report of which excited so much alarm in this City on Tuesday and Wednesday appears in our fourth page—the propagator to be visited with punishment too great for so small an offence, and as he has been found to be unacquainted with military discipline, we doubt not but he will be dealt with according to his merits, as there is a very strong section in the mutiny act for raising false alarms.

On Sunday morning, Edward Deane, Deputy Inspector General, accompanied by Messrs. Hare and Deane, officers of Excise, and a detachment of the 93d Highlanders, stationed at Ennis, made an unexpected visit to the neighbourhood of Fermoy, where they detected an extensive private distillery which they destroyed together with a considerable quantity of Pot-ale, Malt, &c. and the distillers, and lodged in Jail, two men whom they had occupied in grinding malt for the illicit distillery.

Yesterday the Right Worshipful Mayor, fined a hackney-driver ten shillings, for refusing to proceed with a Gentleman who had hired his carriage the previous day, which fine he handed to the Clerk of the House of Industry.

The Sessions of Fermoy have been postponed to Monday, 17th August, and those of Cork, to Tuesday, 18th.

Monday last the High Sheriff of the County of Cork received instructions from the Lord Lieutenant, causing the bodies of the murderers of Mr. Baker, who had been gibbeted near Fermoy, to be taken down and interred in the jail at Clonmel, which was done accordingly on Tuesday.
