On Saturday last, the 4th inst. at Nenagh, the Rev. Daniel Murphy, P. P. of that town for twenty years.—The esteem in which he was held by all ranks, may in some degree be conceived by the concourse of persons who attended his remains to the grave, without distinction of sect or party. The shops were shut during the day of his interment, which was indeed, a day of mourning to the inhabitants of Nenagh, but more especially to the numerous poor who existed by his charities. The amiability of his public and private life, was a continued example of the most unbending virtue, joined with the greatest innocence of manners—his unsullied worth, whilst it cast a reflection on the age in which he lived, edified those under his spiritual guidance, and silenced the tongue of slander and of envy, exacting homage and respect even from the libertine in his career of vice.—His zeal for Religion caused him to undertake the gigantic work of building, a few years since, a new Temple to the Lord, for his numerous parishioners, which he never ceased to forward, at the expense of comfort and of health; the snow and frost of winter, the burning and intense heat of summer, nor the anxious and solicitous entreaties of friends, could for a moment cause a cessation from those labours, which at length deprived society of one of its most amiable members, and the Priesthood, of its brightest ornament. He was, in a word, everything which he ought to be, without a single taint of that which he should not possess; but in the affliction which, by his death, has overwhelmed his friends, (and they were all those who knew him,) they have the consolation of feeling, that he has gone to that place where good men receive their reward.

We have scarce ever had to record an event that has excited such general sympathy as the much lamented death of Henry Cloran, of Loughrea, Esq. His well merited popularity, resulting from a useful, virtuous, and honorable life, was fully exemplified by the universal sentiment of regret manifested by all ranks, on the premature fate of this inestimable man.—In a period of unprecedented danger and difficulty, resulting from the great increase of epidemic, his professional talents and active benevolence, in the cause of the indigent poor, must ever be remembered, and is justly appreciated in the County of Galway—where his death is considered "a public loss." It is lamentable to add, that Mr. Cloran has left a widow and seven children to deplore his premature fate,
