It is supposed they came in a boat from the river.

On Saturday night, at an early hour, as the Surgeons of the 96th Regiment was returning from the barracks, he was stopped a little above the Crescent, by two men who demanded his money; being at a short distance of a sentinel's post near the barracks, he extricated himself from them, but was followed for some time in pursuit after the villains was instantly arrested, but they eluded it.

On Sunday morning, a corporal of the 4th Dragoons on his way to the barracks through Boherbuy was met by a man who pretended intoxication, and solicited to be taken home—on approaching him to convey him home—he grasped at the old quarry one of them grasped at the other's coat, and tore the seals from it, and then ran off. We had good supplies of new Wheat and Oats at market to-day; the quantity of the former exceeded the demand, and it declined 2s. to 3s. per barrel; prices were 42s. to 48s.—Oats were in brisk demand, at 6d. advance—16s. to 20s. being the currency. New Barley was scarce, at 25s. to 32s. Old Oats were also in free demand, at 18s. to 19s.; but old Wheat remained quite neglected. Oatmeal, 16s. to 18s.—Flour very dull, 25s. to 32s. for best seconds. Malt, 45s. 6d. to 47s. for prime; a great deal of inferior at market, altogether unsaleable. Rapeseed, 46s. to 48s.
