

Lord Kilwarden arrived at Mountshannon this week, on a visit to Lord Clare.

His Excellency the Lord Lieutenant and suite reached Killarney on Wednesday evening—His Excellency's presence in Killarney has caused an unusual throng of visitors.—The expectation of a big hunt on the Lakes, adds, considerably, to the literary attractions of the place.

The Sheriff and Common Speaker of Cork, are to proceed to Killarney, with an invitation to His Excellency the Lord Lieutenant, from the Mayor and Corporation of that City, and a request that he may favour them with the appointment of day, on which he would honour them with his company at a civic feast at the Mansion House.

The English Attorney-General has given an injunction in favour of the allowance for travelling expenses to Coroners, for the journey from, as well as to, the place where an inquest is held.

A circumstance has just come to our knowledge, which appears strange, has not before now been seen notice of in some of the public prints: on the 5th of August, Mr. Poole of Cushine, near Cartlinton, a Magistrate of the King's County, was shot in his own meadow, while superintending his hay makers. It appears, that he was in embrassed circumstances, and one of his tenants having volunteered to arrest him under a decree, so having made his caption, some scuffle ensued, and one of the Assistants in the order fired and hit him—he died in six hours after.

Last night, six armed fellows attacked the houses of two farmers, on the lands of Killengriff, in the East Liberties of this City, beyond Major Gough's, and robbed them of money, household furniture, linen, &c. to a large amount. This day, Roger Shine, Esq. of Ballymena, detected a fellow selling a stolen cow to two butchers, on the road near Borheen, and he very properly sent both thief (Pat. Madden) and the buyers to jail.

On Wednesday morning, a jobber, going to the Fair of Ennis, was robbed near Meeleek, by six ruffians, of £100.

The house of Mr. Henry Stephens, of Blennerville County Kerry was entered on Monday night, by some villains, who carried off various articles of property, together with all the provisions, spirits, &c. in the house.

Cooke, the manufacturer of the spurious Tea, whose rescue we mentioned in our last, has been taken near Mill-street, County Kerry.

Mr. Chute's coach house, at Cliffe-hall County Kerry, together with his carriage and jaunting car, were entirely burned on Wednesday night.

Yesterday morning, a boy of about nine years old, was so torn by a cow, at Ardnacrusha, Co. Clare, that his bowels fell out. Surgeon Franklin of this City, was sent for, who replaced them, sewed up the wounds, and there are some hopes of his recovery.
