

**LIMERICK—SEPTEMBER 30.**

In addition to the proposed reductions to be made in the British Army; we understand that the following is intended, viz:—The entire corps of Cavalry Drivers to be dispensed with—one Battalion Royal Engineers, and a-half Battalion Royal Engineers, two Battalions Royal Artillery, and one Battalion invalid Royal Artillery to be reduced—the Field-Officers of Artillery to be placed on full, and the Lieutenants on half-pay.

The following has been addressed to Colonels of Militia Regiments:—

"Dublin Castle, Sept. 26, 1818.

—Referring to the 39th Section of the Act of the 5th Geo. III. Chap. 120. I have it in command from the Adjutant-General, to acquaint you, that his Excellency does not consider it expedient that the Militia of Ireland should be kept out, trained and exercised, for the period thereby specified, in the course of the current year.

It will consequently be unnecessary that the General Orders and other proceedings directed by the same clause should be brought into operation within the ensuing month.

Right Hon. Robert Peel, arrived in London on Wednesday.

On Friday last, a district Court Martial, of which Lieut.-Colonel Hare, 12th Regiment, is the President, assembled in this City, for the trial of Lieut.-Colonel Duffy, of the 96th Regiment, on charges preferred against him for using disrespectful language to Lieut.-Colonel M'Carthy. The proceedings were closed this day.
