At the County Sessions, before the Right
 Worshipful Thomas Lloyd, Assistant-Barrister,
 James Lackin, convicted of an assault, was sen-
 tenced to be confined six weeks, and give bail.—
 At Rathkeale Sessions, John Cronin, convicted of
 perjury, was sentenced to be confined in our County
 Jail for the space of three years; and on the 1st of

 he purchased in Kilrush and brought to Limerick
 to dispose of; this was his first venture which
 proved so unfortunate to himself and numerous
 family. About an hour before he had fallen over-
 board he gave the price of the Oats to one of the
 men in the boat, who, with very commendable
 honesty, delivered it on his return to Kilrush, to
 his afflicted wife.

The fair of Nenagh on Saturday was well
 attended, and the show of cattle considerable, and
 of the best description, which in general brought
 good prices.

On Friday last, the Fair day of this town, a
 most wanton and brutal murder was committed in
 our streets, upon the person of an inoffensive man
 named John Dunlevie, a pensioner resident in this
 town. A trivial altercation having taken place
 between him and a countryman, the latter returned
 in more than an hour after, accompanied by two
 other men, armed with sticks, and furiously assailed
 Dunlevie, as he sat in a chair, selling apples,
 repeating their blows with such shocking effect as
 to produce his speedy death.—An Inquest was held
 by J. Weekes, Esq. Coroner, on the body of the
 deceased, whose verdict was: "That the deceas-
 ed came by his death in consequence of a violent
 beating he received from a party, of which *Daniel*
 and *John Murphy* were the principals." These
 men, it appears, live at *Ballyjerry*—*Traloe*
paper.
