At the County Sessions, before the Right
Worshipful Thomas Lloyd, Assistant-Barrister,
James Larkin, convicted of an assault, was sen-
tenced to be confined six weeks, and give bail. —

family. About an hour before he had fallen over-
board he gave the price of the Oats to one of the
men in the boat, who, with very commendable
honesty, delivered it on his return to Kilrush, to
his afflicted wife.

The fair of Neenagh on Saturday was well

most wanton and brutal murder was committed in

came by his death in consequence of a violent
beating he received from a party, of which Daniel
