

FEVER HOSPITALS, LIMERICK,

The affection with which it has pleased the Committee appointed to superintend the affairs of this City, frequent appeals to the liberality of our citizens, in behalf of these institutions so connected with the best interests of society. — It has not been made in vain, the bounty of our citizens has been generously extended to these asylums for the sick, and the Fever Hospitals of Limerick, under Heaven, the means of preserving the lives of our fellow-creatures, the existence of their families, and of controlling the ravages of a disease, which, even for their salutary influence, must long since have been an aspect of the most deadly pestilence. — It would be the duty of these institutions to announce to their fellow-citizens that the same has obliged them so frequently to solicit their aid, and that they had now only the duty to perform of congratulating them upon the success of their benevolent contributions have produced. — It is with feelings of a very different task. — It is with feelings of sincere regret they are called upon to state, that for admission into the Fever Hospitals continue as at any former period; that the funds have been exhausted by the expenses attendant upon the treatment of 2,663 of their fellow-creatures, since the commencement of this year, but also a very large debt, and that unless by the prompt interference of a public body, the dreadful alternative shall be prevented. — These institutions, which have stood a barrier between the living and the dead, must be closed against the entrance of patients, and this populous City thus consigned to the horrors of certain pestilence and contagion. — To enable the public to estimate correctly the causes which have occasioned this unhappy result, it will be necessary to state those circumstances which have occasioned an expenditure of money in support of these establishments far in excess of what was required for similar periods. — This detail, the Committee trust, will convince their fellow-citizens that the funds at their disposal have been disbursed with the strictest economy, and that their exhausted state was occasioned solely by the paramount claims upon the institutions which a severe and unexampled sickness has occasioned. — At the commencement of this year, the public mind had been agitated for several years by the most formidable malignant fever, the demands upon the Hospital for admission exceeding every former precedent. — To meet this emergency, the Government had recourse to every measure which appeared to render St. John's Hospital (the only establishment occupied by fever patients,) adequate to the formidable task, and from an anxious wish to separate the diseased from the healthy families, they were induced to admit a greater number of wretched creatures than under ordinary circumstances the Hospital ought to have received. — The numbers of patients for admittance however, still continuing to increase, and the accumulated mass of disease in the establishment having precluded the possibility either of further increasing its accommodations, or even affording to its patients that relief which their melancholy situation required, the Government, depending upon the support of the public, in which the safety of every individual was contained, determined from Government the use of the Military Barracks in the Square, and immediately occupied it with a resident apothecary, housekeeper, and eight nurses, for its management. — From this measure, consequences most beneficial have resulted; proper accommodations for 120 additional patients having been provided, the mortality almost immediately decreased, and these two establishments have since afforded to the numerous poor of Limerick and its vicinity, a sure refuge, when threatened with the most formidable perhaps, to which human nature is exposed.

From the 8th of January last to the 6th October, 2,663 have been admitted into these asylums, and of this number 2,484 have been cured, at the aggregate expense of £1,064. the average cost of each individual being £1. 6d. This expenditure, however, occasioned
