In compliance with the request of many of our military Correspondents, we this day commence a list of the several officers who have received honorary marks of distinction during the late war.

The Corps intended to be disbanded are to be gradually reduced: an order has been received to that purport, to discharge 100 of the 96th Regiment forthwith.

Two hundred and thirty of the 39th Regiment were discharged on landing from France.

Two hundred of the 43d Regiment were disbanded at Canterbury on Wednesday. The reductions of worn-out men in the Army by the late order, exceeds ten thousand.

Several Regiments of Dragoons landed at Dover on Sunday.

The 2d Batt. Rifle Brigade embarked on Saturday for Ireland. The 79th Highlanders are now stationed at Portsmouth.

The 77th, quartered at Galway, underwent a considerable reduction last week.

Generals Lord Beresford and Hill, and Admiral Beresford, have arrived in London.

The Session of Parliament will commence on the 19th of January.

Lord Viscount Mount-Earl and suite, have arrived at Cheltenham.

Henry Bracken, Esq. of Kilkenny, is called to the Bar.

The Dublin Society and Physicians of Cork-street Fever Hospital have recommended Doctor Meyler's plan of ventilation.

The Lord Lieutenant has been pleased to signify his intention of becoming Patron to the Southern Fishery Association, established at Kinsale.

Mr. Talbot opened the Drogheda Theatre on Friday evening last.

On Monday last, the Common Pleas granted a Conditional Order for a new trial, in which Mr. Davern of Ennis, is Plaintiff, and the Eagle Insurance Company, London, Defendants. It was twice tried—the last Assizes, in Limerick, and the previous one, at Ennis.

Counsellor Gabbett's Supplement of the Digested Abridgment of the Statute Laws of England and Ireland, was published in Dublin on Saturday.

Mr. Sodea, of Baileborough, Co. Cavan, and his entire family, consisting of his mother, two sons, and five daughters, unfortunately perished in the *Mary Ann*, on their passage to Quebec.

A considerable quantity of fat Cattle have passed through this City within these ten days for Cork—yesterday nearly two hundred excellent bullocks belonging to Mr. Pilkington, arrived here and were driven off for Cork.

John Durack, mate of the *Mary Ann*, lying at this port, was on Thursday morning desperately wounded in the groin, by stabs received from a pilot named Pigott, with whom some warm words took place—Pigott has absconded, and Durack is not out of danger.

On Tuesday, Sarah Ryan was murdered near Doone, in this County. The perpetrator has not yet been apprehended.
