Mourning in this City is very general, and every respect was paid by the inhabitants to the memory of the Queen; all the shops were closed during the entire day, business in the offices suspended, and at the different churches divine service was performed, in the harbour displayed their various flags at half-mast high, the dead bells of the churches have tolled without much intermission day se'night.—The Officers of the regiments in garrison appear in deep mourning, and the corps on duty have their uniforms bedecked with black.

St. Peter's Church on Sunday, was hung with black.

It is a pleasure in stating one of the many acts of benevolence, for which her late Majesty is so particularly distinguished, the recording of her more gratifying by the person who was the object of her bounty and amiable solicitude, so well and so respectably known in the year 1779, the memorable explosion of the Brest, which lasted four hours and a half, and which H. M. S. Quebec bore a conspiracy, and was subsequently blown up, out of which but seventeen persons were saved—
