Extract of a letter from Newport, Co. Tip.,  
dated yesterday:-

"The immediate vicinity of the village was kept in a  
state of ferment the entire morning of Sunday, in conse-  
quence of two portions, which have so long disgraced this  
country, living not by appointment on the Lord's Day,  
to decide their bloody plots. About 10 o'clock they met  
in the village green, and were loaded with clubs, cutlasses, and  
other deadly weapons, when Michael Ryan was so dread-  
fully beaten, that he died on Monday evening; and several  
others dreadfully rent and maimed."

DUBLIN - At the house of Mrs. B. Leigh, Loglanur, on the  
29th ult., of a typhus fever, Margaret Savage, a young  
female who a short time since had been sent from the  
County of Armagh, by the Countess de Salis, to conduct the  
Spinning School established by her in this County.

The untimely fate of this young woman may be con-  
sidered a provincial misfortune, as even the short period of  
her residence here tended to the advancement of the Linen  
Manufacture of this City and vicinity. A liberal wish of  
the Countess de Salis to extend the skill and industry which  
distinguish the North of Ireland to the Count's estate here,  
by visiting which, last Summer, she found the female  
population ignorant and unemployed, led to the plan of a  
Spinning School and Manufacturing Establishment, at  
Loglanur.

Industry and intelligence had raised Margaret Savage  
from a state of orphanage, in which she had been adopted  
by the Countess de Salis, to the head of a similar establish-  
ment, at Tandragee, from which she was sent hither last  
September, to form and superintend one of the same  
description at Loglanur, with directions to teach the valuable  
improvement of the double wheel, wherever wished or  
desired in the South of Ireland. In the month of October  
last, she instructed the different schools and charitable  
establishments of this City, under the direction of the  
Chamber of Commerce, and was on the eve of going for  
the same purpose to Donegal, at the time she was attacked  
by this fatal disease. Her death may be considered a  
public loss, as it has frustrated the enlightened and patriotic  
plans of the Countess de Salis, for the instruction and  
employment of the females on the Count's estate, and the  
introduction of the improved northern system of manufac-  
ture into the finest flax district of this county, and we may  
say of this Island.
