His word was a bond equally registered in the confidence of his fellow labourers, of the Bar, and of the Bench. The death of such an individual, in the active engagements of his profession, and in the noon of life, must be a loss to society; but to the young and beauteous shrubs of his rearing, to the children of his heart, what a dread visitation; we wish not to sharpen sensibility, already on the rack; but, in the range of human affliction, few trials indeed equal to theirs.
