The present year's valuation of these houses, as valued for the Commissioners to £29,657. As the valuation of the same houses by the Commissioners is 30 per cent. under the true value, by adding 30 per cent. they will have £38,556 for the total rent paid, or an average £68 7s. per annum per house. There are 60 houses that have not been valued, which are considered worth £10 per annum.— There are 14 houses as the total number within the parishes and allowing 10 persons to each house, a population of 7,140 souls.

As above, a handsome extensive Court has been built in St. Mary's Parish, a new County Hospital finished, and a new County Jail has been commenced, advanced towards its completion, on a plan, by Mr. Payne, suggested by Mr. Esq—a Dominican Chapel, a Methodist Meeting-house, a Friends Meeting-house, a Wesleyan Chapel, an Independent Chapel, and a Baptist Chapel, all of which have been completed within a short period.
