A woman named Bridget Geraghty, was
 stopped on Thursday morning by the watchmen
 of St. Michael's Parish, with a number of dead
 geese and ducks, which she had, during the night,
 stolen and killed in the neighbourhood of Lemon-
 field, near this City. On her way to the jail, the
 produce of her night's excursion was exhibited,
 borne on a pole by two men after her, where she
 made a full confession of all her crimes and mis-
 demeanours, together with those of her associates,
 and on totting up the list, it appears, within the
 last four months, she was at the killing of 53
 turkeys, 124 geese, 110 ducks, 2 sheep, and 12
 goats, all at night, and her haunts were generally
 between Ardnacrusha, Crus-agalla, Greenwood,
 Roxborough, Ballyneety, and Lemonfield.—
 Among the catalogue of her other thefts were 12
 bags of wheat and 26 bags of oats. She was
 generally assisted by two women of the names of
 Bridget Lynch and Ellen Day, and Patrick Dea,
 to whose house, in Pump-lane, the plunder was
 always brought and disposed of. They went in
 the day-time as beggars, and fixed upon the places
 they were to visit at night. She was fully com-
 mitted to jail by Alderman Watson.

On Wednesday evening some persons stripped
 the lead entirely off the cottage of Roger Scully,
 Esq. near the New Barracks, and took it away.

A man, named Alexander Dogherty, charged
 with desertion from the 3d Dragoon Guards, and
 with having been the leader of a gang of robbers
 who infest the county of Sligo, and the neighbour-
 ing counties, has been committed to the gaol of
 Sligo.

At the last Quarter Sessions of Peterborough,
 two gipsies were convicted of stealing a horse, and
 sentenced to death.

An inquest was held yesterday in the City jail,
