of Commons was occupied till four Tuesday morning in discussing the conduct alleged against Mr. Wyndham. He himself opened the discussion, by a motion which he then withdrew.

Mr. Wilson, after a comment on the evidence, moved several resolutions, leading to a decision that Mr. Quin had violated the purity of the privileges of Parliament, and the rights of the Roturorum.

Mr. Wilbraham moved counter resolutions to negative every thing criminally moved by Sir Robert Wilson; and several others spoke at great length for and against the respective resolutions.

A vote took place, first, on Mr. Wilbraham's motion, conveying a slight censure upon Sir Robert Wilson, 162, against 73.

There followed a division on Sir Robt. Wilson's motion, which were negatived, 131. Mr. Lambton then moved to have Sir Robert Wilson taken into custody for gross prevarication in his evidence, which, after some debate, was negatived—131 against 8.

Mr. Wilbraham's motion, as above, was:—"That the House cannot but express its disapprobation or admission of any such conduct as is improper and blameable; and had it been acting thereon been persisted in, it would (as it appears to have been) speak equivocally disavowed, this House deemed it necessary to visit such a conduct with its severest censure."

Mr. Newport gave notice, that he will on Monday next move that the office of Clerk of the House of Commons be assimilated to the same office in which it is not saleable. The notice was received with loud cheers from every part of the House.
