

lay evening, the House of Lords adjourned for a fortnight.

2d Highlanders are to embark on board the *Atlas* and *Chapman* transports for Jamaica, on Friday next.

A private letter we have received from Major-General Sir M. B. Peel, who we learn that the 45th Regiment, which was disembarked at Cork harbour on the 21st of February, and that island after a passage of nine days. Major-General Wright, Royal Engineers, Lieutenant Colonel Campbell, Major Martin, Capt. Gordon, and other Officers were all well. They were ordered immediately for their destination.

Colonel Watson is appointed to command the 1st Regiment of Artillery at Ceylon, vice Col. Brooke who has obtained leave of absence for England. Major Shuldham succeeds to the command of the 2d Regiment—Capt. Bates, Royal Artillery, is ordered to command at Columbo, and Major Skinner, Royal Artillery, at Trincomalee.

The East India Company have granted Sir M. Peel £1500, for his services on board the

The number includes two Regiments of Light Dragoons, which were disembarked in February last for India, for the relief of other Regiments on that station. The strength of the two Regiments is 929 men.

The Regiments of Cavalry and two of Infantry, are ordered to return to Europe, consisting, in the whole, of 10,000 men.

GENERAL ORDER.

Horse-Guards, 5th April, 1819.

It has been represented to his Royal Highness the Prince of Wales that Lieutenant Thomas Harker, and Ensign Edward Harker, who have recently been placed upon the half pay of the 55th Regiment, have grossly insulted and abused Lieutenant Colonel Frederick, commanding that Regiment, upon the grounds of his conduct towards them in the capacity of Commanding Officer, while they were on duty under his orders.

It would be highly injurious to the discipline of the Army to permit the notion to pass with impunity, that when a soldier is placed upon half pay, he shall feel at liberty to disregard all the restraints of decorum and subordination, by indulging in feelings of personal resentment towards his former Commanding Officer, his Royal Highness the Prince Regent, and on the behalf of his Majesty, has been ordered to command, that his displeasure upon this flagrant misconduct shall be marked by erasing the names of

St. Munchin's—Thomas Myles and Thomas Evans. St. John's—Bassett Dickson and John Barrett.

The Fair of Singland, (Liberties of this City,) yesterday, was well supplied with stock of all descriptions.—Fat Cattle were not sought for—Milch Cows stood at rather high prices, and strippers were quickly bought up at from £7 10s. to 8 guineas each, a few brought 10 guineas.—Pigs were much lower than the late prices.

The brig *Hope*, in thirty days, from New York, with Flaxseed, has arrived at Galway.

H. M. S. of war, *Cyrus*, Capt. White, arrived in this river on Saturday.

On Monday night, some fellows returning home from this City, knocked at the house of William M. Knight, at Annacotty, and demanded admittance—M. Knight desired them to go off, but not having complied, he fired a pistol, loaded only with powder, at them—finding they still persevered, he discharged a fowling-piece, the contents of which lodged in the body of one of them, named Michael Ryan, who was brought into town next morning, and is now in the County Hospital, desperately wounded.

On Sunday night, a house was maliciously burned on the lands of Coolderry, Co. Clare, the property of a poor Widow, named Tracy. She had a few days previous, lodged informations against some sheep-stealers—and it is supposed that act was the cause of this outrage.

On Sunday night Mr. James Kelly, one of the Scattery Revenue Boatmen, was seized with a fit on board the brig *Britannia*, lying at one of our quays, and died in a few hours. An inquest was held next morning by the Right Worshipful Mayor and the Jury returned a verdict, "Died by the visitation of GOD."

Saturday, Thos. Healy, of the grenadier company of the 44th, was hanged at Kilkenny, in presence of the entire regiment, for the murder of John Ryan—he declared his innocence to the last.

A verdict of wilful murder is returned against Pat. Roger, his son and daughter, who are apprehended and lodged in Ennis Jail, by Sir William Reid, for the murder of the daughter's husband, Thady Cunningham, at Scarriff, on Sunday.

Committed on Tuesday, to Ennis Jail, by the Rev. William Hadlock, Patrick Daly, for cutting timber on the lands of Paradise, and for which Mr. Hadlock sentenced him to six months' imprisonment, or pay a fine of Five Pounds.
