The 1st Regiment of the 3d or old Buffs, quartered at Drogheda, replace the 42d at Dundalk. The 1st Regiment of the 92d Highlanders, quartered at Drogheda. Head-quarters at Naas. Major Crawford has been appointed to the command of the Yeomanry, in the Counties of Mayo, Galway and Sligo.

Mr. Deel-Castle, County Mayo, has been elected to serve in Parliament for the Borough of Drogheda, in the room of Edward Denny, Esq. who has accepted the Chiltern Hundreds.

A Flax, one yard long, in full blossom, was sold in this City yesterday.

At the request of a Gentleman who wishes to have a repetition of crime, we state, that the penalty attaches to any person refusing to pay in payment the mint coin for what it is convertible to Law. British shillings and pence of the last coinage, have been rejected, and for more than ten pence, the latter are only for five pence.

Mr. John Simpson, Esq. has bequeathed to the Minister and Church Wardens of the Parish of St. Anne's, Cork, to purchase a piece of property, the issues of which are to be applied to the poor of that Parish.

A petition has been entered into by the Fishing Boats on this Coast, to prevent the Smacks lately arriving from Dartmouth, from establishing a regular mode of Fishing in the Shannon and the other Creeks adjacent thereto—On Wednesday last, about 6 o'clock, whilst the smack Friends, commanded by Edwards master, was preparing to shoot her gun in Brandon Bay, she was boarded by Three men on the shore, full of Men, to the number of thirty, who compelled the crew to go on shore, and taking their lives and the destruction of their property—taking their Boat up into the Village, and obliging them to return to the Smack for upwards of three days, having first compelled them to take an oath, not to come on the Coast again for the purpose of fishing—Informations have been sworn by the people of the Coast, to be forwarded to the

A general change of Quarters of the Army in Ireland, is to take place early in the ensuing month.

The following Proclamation, by the Right Worshipful the Mayor and Sheriffs of Waterford, was issued on Thursday:—

"Whereas several Persons have for some days riotously assembled themselves, and committed acts of violence upon the persons and properties of respectable Inhabitants of this City, under a pretence that they want employment and food—and whereas we have received information, that further tumultuous Meetings are threatened to be held, and violence to be committed against a number of peaceable and respectable Citizens—and whereas such illegal proceedings are punishable by the most severe penalties of the Law: Now we, Sir Simon Newport, Deputy Mayor, and one of his Majesty's Justices of the Peace for this City, and Henry Aleck and William Weekes, Esqs. Sheriffs, do hereby prohibit and forbid any Persons, exceeding the number of three, to meet or assemble themselves in any part of this City or its Liberties; and we direct and order all persons to remain in their houses, or at their lawful occupations, as they shall answer the contrary at their peril. And we give this further notice, that we are determined to support and enforce the Laws, to the last extremity, if necessary, and to punish in the most signal and exemplary manner all those who shall dare to violate them. In this emergency, we call upon all classes of our Fellow Citizens for their co-operation and assistance in the preservation of the public peace and tranquility—Given at the Town Hall.—May 19, 1819."
