

On examination, the entire was found with them, and both were identified by Mr. Allwell and his steward. Their names are Michael Kennedy and John Kingelty, were discharged at the last Assizes of Clonmel for highway robbery. Nothing could exceed the activity and zeal of the country people in this respect, when it was announced the pursuit was a robbery, which reflects very great credit upon the part of the country; and if such conduct was acted in other places, villains of this description would hardly venture to commit acts of highway robbery in the noon-day. They confessed they were waiting to rob a Mr. Maher, who was expected to be at the fair with a large sum of money, being disappointed in his appearance, they resolved to try their hands with Mr. Allwell.

On the night of Saturday, the 8th inst. the house of John M. Dermott, of Derryvoulen, near Clonmel, County Galway, miller, was attacked by eight men, well armed, who robbed him of a considerable sum of money. From the exertions made by Sir Wm. Read, who has got information of the robbers, it is expected the entire gang will be apprehended.

Yesterday, Martin Cleary, Keeper of Groody Gap-pike-gate, was summoned before the Mayor, Robert O Callaghan Newenham, Esq. for using a British six-pence, tendered in payment of his demand at the above gate, and having expressed much contrition, he submitted and paid six shillings and six pence to the Mendicity Association.
