The Office of Mr. McNeill, in Henry Street, was robbed on Wednesday night of about £5. in Silver.—It is supposed the person who committed the robbery secreted himself in the store during the day, as there was no appearance of the door being broken, and a bag was found nailed to the floor near the first loft, by which he let himself out in the street.

The house of Edmund Harrold, near Bridgetown, County Clare, was broken into on Thursday night, by 8 or 9 ruffians, who fired several shots therein, dragged Harrold out on the road—beat him unmercifully with a cutting whip on the back, and swore him never to speak of it after—they carried away a box containing several articles and forty shillings in silver.

A gang of ruffians from this City, had the audacity to break into and rob three houses near Thomond-Gate, on Thursday night: from one house they took a firkin of butter, some wearing apparel, and a few pounds in money. In the morning they were observed dividing the spoil, in a field near the Circular road, and a person being made, one of them was taken—the others are known.

An old man named Hoban, was robbed by a strolling beggar at Castlebar, on Thursday night, of £160 in cash and notes—both robber and booty have since been got.
