We have just been informed by a gentleman
from Dunleary, that the vessel destined to convey
troops to South America, was yesterday detain-
ed by a Revenue Cutter, and the men sent on shore.
The cause assigned for this proceeding is, that the
vessel had a greater number of men on board than
allowed by the Act of Parliament, regulating
the proportion between the tonnage of vessels and
the number of passengers which they may take.—
It is stated that the Master of the vessel was aware
he had an extra-number of men—that the sur-
plus number was sent on shore before de-
parture, and that they were then very foolishly and
improperly taken down to Dunleary and re-shipped.
The Revenue Cutter stationed off Dunleary, was
the cause of this proceeding, and immediately on the
departure of the Patriot vessel followed and detained
