returned against Mr Francis Taggard, for defa-

at £3,000.

Twenty-three convictions occurred at Roscom-
mon, four to be hanged, the remainder ordered for
transportation.

The Fermanagh Assizes have proved maiden—
at Philipstown, Michael Cullahan for cow-stealing
and Michael Burke for robbery, were sentenced
for transportation—the remaining convictions were
for larceny.

A man named Michael Cooney of Killuran,
Co. Clare, on his way home from this City after
the fair on Wednesday last, fell from his horse in
Broadford, and was killed on the spot.
