The weather was very fine, and a great concourse of fashion, &c. appeared in the course; and although but one Steward, (Mr. Croker) not the smallest dispute occurred during the meeting in respect to the runnings.

It is lamented that our Races did not end without murder, as on Saturday evening, after the military retired, a dreadful battle occurred between two factions who were not only armed with bludgeons, but also with fire arms; the battle lasted some hours to the terror of many peaceable persons who intended to dine at the course—the issue of the disgraceful scene was, that three were badly wounded and one unfortunate being named James Glinnane, fell a victim to ferocity which is most disgraceful.—An Inquest was held on his body on Sunday by the Mayor, and the following verdict returned:

"That on the 14th day of August, instant, at the course of Newcastle, a riot commenced between two parties of men, one party denominated the College, the other party called Meiskavalligis; the College party armed, some with fire arms, fired several shots—But James Glinnane received a fracture on his forehead, which caused his death on the night of the same day."

Monday night, the Captain of a Merchant vessel was stopped on Thomond-bridge by three Yellows, who robbed him of his watch, a one pound note, and thirty shillings in silver. One of the party named Patrick Kelly was apprehended yesterday, and the watch found upon him; he was fully identified and is committed to jail.
