It is requested to state by many respectable persons that scarcely a night passes without some robbery being committed in this County, and that several meetings held in various parts; upon the subject of which, arms are sought for and those marauders, who disperse themselves in small divisions for that purpose.

During the house of Mr. Garrett Fitzgarret Croagh, in this County, was attacked by a party of armed fellows who were resolutely opposed by him and his three sons; in the act of opening the door, and after discharging a bullet one of the ruffians was shot in the breast; another, in forcing the window, was shot under the arm. The two wounded were taken up by their companions, who retreated most speedily in a sledge, two hats, and a sword, outside of which their blood was traced along the wall as the Commons of Rathkeale. The attacking party broke into M'Carthy's house, a few hours before, and took there Mr. Fitz-Gibbon and his sons are the thanks of the community, for their brave and spirited conduct.

The outrage was committed on Sunday evening near the County Hospital, by three ruffians who knocked down Corporal Lee, of the Royal Artillery, with a stone, which fractured his skull, and wounded his wife and another woman—Mr. Desbrisay, in the most praiseworthy manner, has offered a reward of Ten Guineas in the Paper, for information against the perpetrators; and we trust the Citizens of Limerick will be wanting in co-operation to bring to punishment the villains of so deep a cast.
