Lieut. Colonel J. French is appointed Quarter-General to the Connaught District, and is attached to Major-General O'Loughlin's Staff at one.

Major Rainey, 55th, is appointed Aid-de-Camp and Commander of the Forces in Scotland.

Lieutenant-Colonel Tomkins, 53rd Regiment, (formerly Major Tomkins, of this City,) is appointed to the command at the Bahamas.

Major Maxwell, 15th Regiment, has replaced Lieutenant Colonel Ximenes, 62d, in command at Madaga.

Major-General Lionel Smith is appointed a General Officer on the Staff in India, and is third in command at the Presidency of Bengal.

The office of Secretary to the Master-General of Ordnance is vacant by the death of Sir Hervey, Bart.

The Duke of Richmond, whose much lamented decease we publish this day, was born in the year 1711. His Grace was Lord Lieutenant of Ireland from the 19th of April, 1807, to August 25, 1813, and died Governor General of the Canadas and British possessions in North America. He was General and Colonel of the 35th Regiment, Governor of Plymouth, Lord Lieutenant and Viscount of the County of Sussex, and Steward of Chichester. His titles and honours to the Dukedom of Richmond were Duke of Lennox in Scotland, and of Cambridge in France. He is succeeded in his honours and estates by his eldest son, the Earl of Surrey, now Duke of Richmond.
