in Spain and France under the Duke of Wellington,) fell a  
sacrifice to the fever which has proved so fatal to many of  
our brave veterans since their arrival in this island. We  
lament to add, that in a few days after, his eldest son, Henry  
M'Veagh North, also died, in the sixth year of his age.  
Lieut. North was the second surviving son of Charles North,  
Esq. of Dublin, and has left a wife and infant son to deplore  
their irreparable loss. It will be remarked, that the 50th  
Regiment marched from Dublin to embark for Jamaica, in  
January last, and, since their arrival there, have lost the  
following officers: Lieut.-Colonel Hill, Majors Rowe and  
Montgomery, Lieuts. Richardson and North, Ensign Barlow,  
Paymaster Montgomery, Adjutant Lyon, and Assistant-  
Surgeon Browne—At Kingston, of a fever, George Isaacs,  
Esq. of London, merchant—In Dublin, Alexander, son of  
Mr. Alexander Wall, of this City—Ellen, daughter of Mr.  
C. Curtain, of Cork, merchant—Colonel Peter Batten Bold,  
1st Royal Lancashire Regiment—Alderman Park, of Lan-
