On Saturday week, a detachment of the 10th Regiment of Foot marched into Edinburgh Castle, from Stirling, to relieve two companies of the 45th, who are immediately to follow the remainder of the Regiment to England. On the 8th instant, a troop of the 10th Hussars marched from Parkhill Barrack for Perth.

On Wednesday last, two companies of the 33rd Regiment marched into Blackburn from Rochester. Expensive premises, situate in Penny street, have been taken, for the purpose of being formed into Barracks, to which place they will be removed.

The additional five hundred marines are to be equally distributed at the four divisions of Portsmouth, Plymouth, Chatham, and Woolwich. It does not, however, appear, that any augmentation to the present number of Officers on full pay is to take place.

The Depots appropriated by Government, at which the ten new Royal Veteran Battalions are to be embodied, are as follows:—1st Battalion, at Chatham; 2d, at Portsmouth; 3d, at Plymouth; 4th, at Hull; 5th, at Chester; 6th and 7th, at Inverness and Edinburgh; and three in Ireland. The total amount of this force, when completed with Officers and men, will be upwards of one thousand two hundred.
