Harvey Esq. stated to the meeting, that  
 work at the period when the first year's account  
 Savings Bank were auditing—at that meeting,  
 men, labourers, and all others who had made  
 the cheering prospect of seeing all the Debenture  
 amount of £22,231, handed by the President to  
 Mr. Harvey then read a Report of the  
 Bank for one year from the 20th December,  
 25th December, 1848, with a statement of the  
 The deposits made in that period were—from  
 men, with interest, £456—from 134 female servants,  
 from 30 men servants, £1,004—from 130 trades-  
 shop-keepers, and dealers, £2,333—from 28  
 7—from 24 farmers, £945—from 7 soldiers,  
 from 13 friendly and charitable societies, £397—  
 from 13 females, unmarried, and widows, £5,440, &c. &c.  
 His compliments to the ability of Dr. Murphy,  
 his exertions in its establishment, and concluded  
 that in the formation of the Bank in this City,  
 it would be wanting for an out-fit, such as the  
 books, paying a clerk, &c. and that a trifling  
 would effect that object.  
 The subscription was immediately commenced, which in  
 is not to exceed One Guinea.
