

**NEXT THURSDAY THE FIRST LOTTERY TICKETS, ONLY FIVE THOUSAND TICKETS TO BE DRAWN, WITH THE CHANCE OF SIX PRIZES OF FIFTY THOUSAND POUNDS—TWO OF THEM IN THE FIRST FIVE MINUTES.**

His Grace the Duke of Wellington, Master General of the Ordnance, has been pleased to appoint Colonel Lord Fitzroy Somerset, to be his private Secretary, vice Sir Felton Hervey, Bart.

The 24th Regiment of Light Dragoons, commanded by Colonel Baron Tuyl, was disbanded on the 24th ult.

Tuesday morning, a troop of the 10th Hussars detached from Piershill barracks, to do duty in the north of Scotland.

A considerable alteration is making in the uniform of the 10th Hussars. The new clothing is to be issued about Christmas, and is said to be very superb. A serjeant's jacket is contracted for at £13.

We understand that 20 men per company are to be added to the Regiments now in England, over and above the Individuals called out from half-pay to garrison duty. Six Lieutenants and one Assistant Surgeon, to be added to each corps of Infantry.

The 1st Veteran Battalion, stationed at Chatham, is now fully complemented in Officers and men, and when accoutred, will exhibit a fine body of nearly 1,000 serviceable soldiers, very few of whom exceed forty years of age.

Upwards of 800 men, of the Out pensioners, have arrived at Fort Curberland, to form the 2d Battalion of Royal Veterans.

The assembling of the Pensioners at Manchester reduced 2,400, out of whom 1,300 were found fit for duty. They have proceeded to Shrewsbury, under the command of Lieut.-Colonel Coghlan, Inspecting Field Officer at this District, now Commander of the 5th Veteran Battalion.

At the muster of the Veterans on Wednesday, at Chelsea, 1,400 were struck off the Pension List, for non-appearance.

We are informed that upwards of 6,000 of the Out Pensioners in England, have not appeared to take care of themselves, in consequence of which they will lose their pensions.

The Brilliant transport, arrived at Portsmouth, on Wednesday, from the Mauritius, with the remainder of the 22d Regiment on board, which landed on Saturday morning, at Gosport, and marched immediately to the head-quarters of the Regiment, in Northamptonshire.

On Tuesday, the Medusa transport, Lieutenant Richard, agent, arrived at Portsmouth from the Mauritius. The accounts she brings of the fever, which has been known to prevail there during the months of August, September, October, and part of November, prove its destructive influence, particularly to the troops and Europeans; the natives not having suffered in any proportion.
