Mr. William Griffith, of Laurelhill, County Antrim, was shot in a duel, by Mr. M'Mahon, of Carrickmacross, on Thursday.

The Countess of Clanrickarde has established a new School at Loughrea, for the education of the poor.

Mrs. Bellingham has fitted up her saloon as a Theatre—the profits to be rendered to charity.

Several inhabitants have been lately fined for obstructing passages to their houses, to permit gasometers to be put up.

The loyal inhabitants of the Baronies of Dunmore, Ballymoe, and Traquim, Co. Galway, comprising a population of 100,000, have tendered their services to Government, to act as Cavalry and Infantry, to resist the illegal associations of disaffected persons, that have confederated themselves in that quarter.

A Paper called "The Irishman," published at Bellast, states, that several spirited inhabitants of that town, and of the Parishes of Bangor, Greybeey, Newtownards, Ballyeaston, Ballycastle, Ballyclare, Lisburn, Carnmoney, and Malone, are determined to abstain from whiskey.

A meeting is to be called, in a few days, of the inhabitants of Dublin, to petition against the New Laws extending to Ireland.

**CASE OF MR. GREENE.**

Michael Greene, Gent. Attorney, who had been convicted by a July Commission, of altering a Declaration which had been filed in the Court of King's Bench, in the case of *per a. Patterson*, was brought up for judgment, and on being questioned in the usual form, why judgment should be passed against him, pleaded the King's gracious pardon—whereupon only then arose, and addressed Mr. Greene nearly as follows:—

Mr. Greene, you have been found guilty by a Jury in the Court, at the Commission in July last, of altering a Declaration filed in the Court of King's Bench; although I am not one of your Judges, yet the Judges who presided on that occasion, have given their opinion, that from the evidence given on your trial, they not only saw such ground for such a verdict against you, (whatever may be the motives of the Jury for returning such a verdict) but that you were actually as innocent of the offence to your charge as any man on that Jury or in this Court; and I feel it a duty towards you to declare here, that it was the unanimous opinion of the Court of King's Bench on the report made by the Judges who presided at your trial; I feel particularly happy in doing you this justice, in seeing you restored to that character and rank in which you seem uniformly to have sustained. You are discharged, Sir."

Greene bowed respectfully to the Court, and withdrew.

On the 9th instant, came on at Armagh, the election of a Surgeon to the County Infirmary. The successful candidate was Doctor Scott. This Gentleman is every way qualified to fill the situation.
