Between the hours of 9 and 10 o'clock last night, the offices of the farm house of Patrick Hartigan at Donoughmore, in the liberties of this city, were broken into and a valuable horse taken out, which caused Hartigan with his family instantly to start up a pursuit, and having come up to the house, they who were armed with pistols and muskets, one of them fired at Hartigan, the contents of which lodged in his eyes. The unfortunate man has been brought to the County Hospital, and presents a most melancholy appearance. His life is in imminent danger.

Laughlin, the second fellow concerned in the robbery in Mary-street on Tuesday night, was apprehended by Mr. Johnston, High Constable on Wednesday evening, and lodged in Jail.

Sergeant Quin, of the City Cork Militia Staff, was arrested on Wednesday at Cork, by a Regimental Sergeant Major, for having in his possession cows, which he was endeavouring to be stolen—the inquiry was had in consequence of an instance of Colonel Sir N. C. Colthurst, Bt. —sentence not announced.

The continued frost and snow since our last has considerably impeded the progress of travelling — The Dublin mail which should be here at 3 o'clock, did not arrive on Wednesday afternoon until half-past 6 o'clock—on Thursday, until half-past five o'clock morning—and yesterday's mail at 6 o'clock, p. m. The country mails have also been impeded in their progress.

The coach from Waterford and also the cars from this City and Clonmel, arrived here since the snow at the usual hours.

The Day Coach from this to Dublin, was upset at Monrath on Tuesday morning, but no injury occurred to any of the passengers.

We have heard of a truly melancholy event, which, report says, occurred on Tuesday last.—A party was conveying to a burying place, in an open boat on the upper lake of the Shannon which was frozen across, and attended by a vast concourse of people; while about half way, the ice broke, and the entire party were precipitated beneath, and all perished, the number who attended it is reported to exceed 50 persons.

Extract from an Act passed in the 50th Year of His present Majesty's Reign, chap. 192, sec. 7.

“And be it further enacted, that it shall and may be lawful for any Justice of the Peace in Ireland to arrest and bring before him, or cause to be arrested or brought before him, any Stranger sojourning or wandering, and to examine him or her on Oath respecting his or her Place of Abode, the Place from whence he or she came, his or her manner of livelihood, and his or her object or motive for remaining or coming into the County, City, or Town in which he or she shall be found: and unless he or she shall answer to the Satisfaction of such Magistrate shall commit him or her to Jail or the house of Correction, there to remain until he or she shall find such security as aforesaid, or until he or she shall be discharged by such Magistrate: provided always, that such Magistrate shall without delay, after such committal, transmit to the Lord Lieutenant or other Chief Governor or Governors of Ireland for the time being, a true and faithful Report of such committal, and the grounds and Reasons thereof, the amount of bail required, with the Examination of the Prisoner, and the reasons alleged by him why he or she should not be committed, which such Magistrate is required to take down in writing, in order that such Person may be detained or discharged as to the Lord Lieutenant or other Chief Governor or Governors of Ireland for the Time being may see fit to direct.”
