DEATH—On Sunday evening, at his seat, Charlton-House, Wiltshire, John Howard, Earl of Suffolk, and Berkshire, Viscount Anjou, and Baron Howard of Charlton, a General in the Army, Colonel of the 44th Regiment of Foot, Governor of Londonbridge and Culmster Forts. His Lordship was in the 81st year of his age, having been born the 7th of March, 1750. He succeeded the late Earl in 1783, and married, in 1774, India, daughter of John Gaskarth, Esq. of the County of Cumberland, by whom he left issue Thomas Viscount Anjou, born 1778, now Earl of Suffolk, and one daughter, Lady Catharine Howard—At Patrington, William Dolman Taylor, Esq.—At Greenock, Mrs. Anne Fullerton, relict of the Rev.
