A Privy Council was held at Dublin Castle, on Saturday, when a reward of £100. was offered for the apprehension of the persons who fired several shots at James H. Burke, Esq. a Magistrate, on his return from Galway to St. Cleran's—a pardon is granted to any accomplice who may give information on the subject.

Monday, the Mayor received the following reply to the City Limerick Address, to the King:—  
"Dublin Castle, 18th March, 1820.

"SIR—The Lord Lieutenant having transmitted the very loyal and dutiful Address of the Noblemen, Gentlemen, Clergy, and other Inhabitants of the City and Liberties of Limerick, to the King, I am directed by his Excellency to acquaint you, that he has received a Letter from Viscount Sidmouth, one of his Majesty's principal Secretaries of State, signifying that his Majesty was pleased to receive the same in the most gracious manner.

Edward Synge Cooper, Esq. has given the most munificent donation of One Thousand Five Hundred Pounds to erect a Fever Hospital and Dispensary in Sligo.

Sunday last Serjeant Joy, after inspecting the new County Jail, proceeded for Tralee, and on Monday Mr. Justice Jebb passed through here from his brother's, the Rev. John Jebb, Abington, and yesterday opened the County Kerry Assizes.

- Richard Forde, Michael Forde, and John Fitzgibbon, for burglary and robbery in the house of John Hogan, to be hanged on Wednesday, 5th April.
- Daniel Duggan, for burglary in the house of John Kelly, to be hanged on Wednesday, 12th April.
- Darby Coomby, for burglary in the house of John Lee, to be hanged same day.
- Patrick Kelly, for highway robbery, to be hanged same day.
- John Colburne and P. Tracy, for manslaughter, to be confined twelve months.
- John Morrissey sen. and John Morrissey jun. for manslaughter, to be confined twelve months.
- Michael Cusack, Mitty Conlon, D. Curtayne, and Cornelius Ryan, to be confined twelve months; and twelve others for minor offences, to be severally confined.

At the Assizes of Waterford, up to Saturday last, in the County Court, two received sentence of death, and four transportation; in the City, seven were ordered to be transported.

A respite has been received for Michael and Pat. M'Grath and Denis Slattery, now under sentence of death in Ennis Jail.

Timothy Lynch, after an investigation before Major Warburton and Thomas Crowe, Esq. is committed to Ennis Jail, charged on the oath of Mr. Thomas Comyn, with suspicion of having administered poison to him in porter, on the night of the 11th instant.

Timothy Toole, of Waterford, whilst executing a process of law, was murdered at Ballymountain, Co. Kilkenny, on Wednesday.
