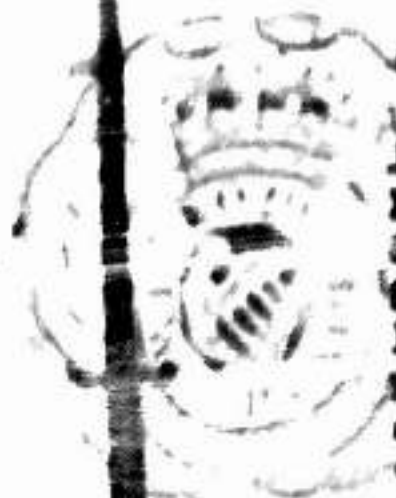

On Thursday evening, died at his lodgings, Pall-mall-street, J. Fitzgibbon, Esq. late of the City of London Regiment. He was loved and respected by every individual of that Corps—wherever he had been quartered, he conciliated the friendship and secured the esteem of the inhabitants. At Rotherham, his conduct was so conspicuous, that a most respectable meeting, consisting of the Nobility and Gentry of the neighbourhood, sent him, through the newspapers, a very flattering Address of regret at his detachment's removal from them—in his attachments he was ardent; in his friendships, zealous and steady, in the relative duties of son and brother, he stood untrammelled. It may be truly said, he lived universally esteemed, and died sincerely lamented by his fellow-citizens, and highly respectable family and connections.
