The Hardwicke Revenue Cutter, Lieutenant
Mottley, captured on the evening of the 16th ult.
after a chase of two days, off the Calf of Man, on
the coast of Ireland, a large smuggler, under
Dutch colours, called the Ven, out fourteen days
from Fleskung, with a complement of ten men;
and her cargo, which consists of tobacco, tea, and
pepper, is estimated at the value of £5000.

The Staff of the North and of the South Mayo
Militia, which have been for a long time past so
usefully employed on the borders of the County
Mayo, have returned to their quarters at Ballina
and Westport—their services being, from the pre-
sent tranquil state of the country, no longer neces-
sary, in the posts they have lately occupied.

This day, Richard Ford, Michael Ford, (brothers)
and John Fitzgerald, were hanged at Grattan's
Green, for burglary and robbery in the house of
John Hogan, near Patrick's Well.

A most disgraceful scene took place in this City
on Sunday evening last. The remains of
Clancy, who was hanged on Saturday for the
shameful outrage on a Female committed on the
Salmon-Weir Bank, was carried for interment,
and attended by a vast concourse of persons,
preceded by eight young Women, dressed in
white, bearing a garland of flowers. Can any
thing more particularly mark the moralization
of the lower orders than this circumstance?

Eight men, convicted of Ribbonism at the
Assizes of Galway, arrived here yesterday on their
way to Cork for Botany Bay.

The mills of Maitlands, near Callan, which
were burned on Monday, were insured by the
Royal Exchange and Atlas for £5000.

On Monday, the Albion, Thomson, from Char-
leston to Liverpool, thirty-five days out, was lost
on the Wexford coast, in consequence of having
mistaken the Tower Light for Foscar. She now
lies on the Burrow of Ballyveague. Her cargo,
1073 large bales of cotton, and about 50 tons of
rice, is all saved. The vessel and cargo are rated
at £30,000. The materials of the vessel, with
the crew, are also saved.

The Committee of the Asylum of Enquiry, acknowl-
