Extract of a letter from an Officer, containing an account of the mortality among the troops in Jamaica, by the yellow fever which prevailed there in the course of last year:—92d Regiment—Landed 461, died 290; women 72, died 32; children 66, died 23; Officers 27, died 10; Officers' wives 6, died 4; Officers' children 5, died 4.—50th Regiment—12 Officers and 230 men died.—61st Regiment—1 Major, 1 Captain, and 40 men died.—38th Regiment—Paymaster died.—Royal Artillery—1 Captain and 40 men died.

In a period of the last six years, the casualties by death amongst the Officers of the Madras Army, who held the rank specified, on the 1st of October, 1813, have been as follow:—

London Corn Exchange, April 10. Our Market was very largely supplied with Wheat this Morning from Essex, and Kent, exclusive of a considerable quantity that remained over from last week's arrivals, the demand for which was very slight, and what few sales were made were at full 2s. per quarter under the prices of this day week. The Barley trade was very heavy, although the supply was small; a few picked samples obtained last Monday's prices; but the middling qualities were nearly unobtainable, at a reduction of 2s. per quarter. Oats are 1s. per quarter cheaper, the arrivals far exceeding the demand; which is the case with Beans and Peas.
