DEATH OF WM. HOLLAND, P. Esq. OF ARTHUR'S-QUAY.

With heartfelt sorrow we have to announce, that the dreadful accident which occurred to our highly respectable fellow-citizen, William Holland, P. Esq. (as stated in our last) terminated fatally; he breathed his last at his house in Dublin, on Wednesday. It would far exceed the limits of our publication, to do justice to the memory of so inestimable a character—suffice it to say, that during a period of half a century, he was in every sense a respectable Attorney, for he combined the strictest integrity with a talent and ability unprecedented; his disinterested advice, and his steady disposition, acquired for him the most attached and sincere friends—in every situation of life, the honest and upright man was conspicuous, and to such a character, so justly exalted in public and private opinion, we cannot do better than hold up to the rising generation an example so desirable to be imitated. To an amiable wife, he was the most domestic husband, and to his affectionate children a loving parent; to his country, liberal and considerate, and to the poor a munificent benefactor. The death of such a man is a source of the deepest affliction, and the remembrance of him will not soon be forgotten. His remains will be interred in the family vault at St. Munchin's, in this City, between two and three o'clock to-morrow.

Our market was well supplied with Wheat to-day, the demand for which was heavy, except prime samples of wheat from Essex, which obtained last Monday's prices; but all other sorts were exceedingly dull, and fell 1s. per quarter lower. Barley is from 2s. to 3s. per quarter cheaper, the mashing season being now over, and what appeared this morning could not be got off at the above reduction. Oats are 1s. per quarter lower, having large arrivals. Beans and Peas are 2s. per quarter cheaper, the demand for each being small. In other articles there is no alteration.
