Our market was well supplied with Wheat to-day, the demand for which was heavy, except prime samples of wheat from Essex, which obtained last Monday's prices; but all other sorts were exceedingly dull, and fell 1s. per quarter lower. Barley is from 2s. to 3s. per quarter cheaper, the milking season being now over, and what appeared this morning could not be got off at the above reduction. Oats are 1s. per quarter lower, having large arrivals. Beans and Peas are 2s. per quarter cheaper, the demand for each being small. In other articles there is no alteration.
