Edward Butler, Esq. is elected Sovereign of Carlow.
Monday last, at a general Meeting of the Governors of the Fever Hospital, the Lord Bishop of Limerick in the Chair, the present four Physicians were re-elected. On the motion of the Rev. Edward M. Butler, a vote of Thanks to Henry W. Bayler, Esq. for his continued attention to the interests of the Institution, as Treasurer, was carried unanimously, and it was then resolved, that the resolution passed at a Meeting of the Governors, some time since, to purchase a piece of Plate to be presented to him with a suitable inscription thereon, be immediately proceeded upon.

An inquest was held by the Mayor on Monday, in the County Hospital, on the body of Michael O'Shaughnessy, butcher, who had died the previous evening, from the effects of a beating which he received on Saturday last, at the Old Market House, from some persons of his own occupation. A verdict of wilful Murder has been returned against four, one of whom, Patrick Cooney, sen. has been committed to Jail, to abide his trial.

A woman of the name of Mologhney, against whom a neighbour of her's entertaining some jealousy, was murdered by her a few days since near Teverston, County Tipperary. She was way-laid in the evening, her brains beaten out with stones, and then conveyed to the banks of a river where the body was thrust in, under a tree. The perpetrator has been arrested, and committed to Clonmel Jail, by Thomas Going, Esq.

Friday evening, a boy, about six years of age, fell into a quarry hole at Ballyhane Turnpike, Co. Tipperary, and before assistance could be had, perished.

On Saturday evening, two Soldiers of the 79th Regiment, bathing at the back of the Castle-Barracks, at low water, were swept with the current through the weir; one of them clung to the rocks, and the other passed down the great fall, with every appearance of immediate death, a young man of the name of Pat. Healy, perceiving his situation, at the risk of his own life, ran a small boat down the fall in the most heroic manner, and succeeded in saving the soldier from a watery grave. This is a third instance of Haley's success in saving persons in a similar way.

Anthony Jordan, for the murder of his wife at Corofin, has been committed to Ennis Jail. This ruffian was apprehended by the Police.

Yesterday morning, some tenants of Mr Bodkin, at Killonay, near this City, apprehended William Partell and son, Cornelius Grady, and William M'Namara, in whose possession fire arms and gunpowder were found. They were taken lurking near a farm-house, which they purposed to rob. In the course of the day, two more of their companions, Thady Cronin and Mary Godfrey, were secured. They are all lodged in jail by the Mayor.

To-morrow, Daniel Dowling, who was banished three years since, and sentenced to be hanged, is to be sent from our County Jail to the Penitentiary in Dublin, there to remain for life.
