

Monday morning last, the 7th Regiment of Foot Guards, stationed at Piershill, near Limerick, and commanded by Colonel Dunne, reviewed on the extensive Sands of Porto Bello, by Major-General Sir Thomas Bradford, G. B. commanding the Forces in North Britain. The success of the day brought a numerous assemblage of spectators to the spot, who were gratified with the rapidity and correctness with which the various evolutions of this excellent Regiment were performed, and which drew forth the unqualified approbation of the Major-General. Monday, several Officers belonging to the 15th, 20th, and 62d Regiment, embarked from Cowes, on board the ship *Glory*, to join their respective Regiments on the Halifax station, and sailed on the following day.

The *Thomas and Mary* transport sailed from Cowes, on Monday last, with troops, for Quebec.

The following General Order has been issued by His Royal Highness the Commander-in-Chief, in consequence of the late occurrences in the 1st Battalion of the 3d Regiment of Guards:—

GENERAL ORDER.

Three Guards, June 24, 1820.

It had been the intention of the Commander-in-Chief to have the issue of an investigation into the circumstances attending the recent occurrences in the 1st Battalion of the 3d Regiment of Guards, before His Royal Highness should have had the opportunity to make any observations, which the nature of the occurrences, and his sense of duty to the service might have required; but the exaggerated rumours which have agitated the public mind upon this occasion, being calculated to shake the confidence which the Army, and the Nation in general, have ever reposed in the British Guards; His Royal Highness feels it incumbent upon him to take this method of declaring that the King places the most firm reliance upon the attachment, good order, and discipline, which have distinguished and rendered the different Corps of his Majesty's Guards an object of just pride, and boast of the Nation; and that His Majesty could never permit himself to believe, that a casual departure from the principles of discipline in any one Battalion—the instigators of which will be detected and punished, as they may be found to deserve—afford any just grounds for entertaining a suspicion calculated to injure the reputation earned in the face of the Nation, by the gallant services of all the Regiments composing this distinguished body of troops.

It is, therefore, as the Commander-in-Chief must have any dereliction of the strict principles of subordination, which some discontented and evil disposed individuals have originated in the 1st Battalion of the 3d Regt. of Guards, it is still a satisfaction to reflect, and it is with pride that His Royal Highness indulges the feeling, that the disposition of the other Regiments of Guards remains firm in a becoming obedience of what is due to discipline and authority; and that they are incapable of bartering their high character for a momentary gratification in discontents, which are equally frivolous as they are groundless.

This Order shall be read at the head of every Regiment and Battalion of the Army, and entered in the Orderly Book.
