Munday morning last, the 7th Regiment of Dragoon Guards, stationed at Piershill, near Edinburgh, and commanded by Colonel Dunne, reviewed on the extensive Sands of Porto

do, by Major-General Sir Thomas Bradford, C.B. commanding the Forces in North Britain.

The brightness of the day brought a numerous assemblage of spectators to the spot, who were gratified with the rapidity and correctness with which the various evolutions of this excellent Regiment were performed, and which drew forth unqualified approbation of the Major-General.

Munday, several Officers belonging to the 15th, 20th, and 62d Regiment, embarked from Cowes, board the ship Glory, to join their respective regiments on the Halifax station, and sailed on the ensuing day.

on Monday last, with troops, for Quebec. The following General Order has been issued by His Royal Highness the Commander-in-Chief, relative to the late occurrences in the 1st Battalion of the 3d Regiment of Guards:—

## "GENERAL ORDER.

" Horse-Guards, June 24, 1820.  
It had been the intention of the Commander-in-Chief to issue an investigation into the circumstances of the recent occurrences in the 1st Battalion of the 3d Regiment of Guards, before His Royal Highness should make to the Army any observations, which the nature of the occurrences, and his sense of duty to the service might suggest; but the exaggerated rumours which have agitated the public mind upon this occasion, being calculated to impair the confidence which the army, and the nation in general, have ever reposed in the British Guards, His Royal Highness feels it incumbent upon him to take this method of showing that the King places the most firm reliance upon the attachment, good order, and discipline, which have distinguished and rendered the different corps of his Guards an object of just pride, and honor, of the country; and that His Majesty could never permit himself to suppose, that a general departure from the principles of discipline in any one Battalion—the instigators of which will be detected and punished, as they may be found to deserve—afford any just grounds for entertaining a suspicion regarding the reputation earned in the face of the world, by the gallant services of all the Regiments comprising this distinguished body of troops.

It is, therefore, as the Commander-in-Chief must state any dereliction of the strict principles of subordination, which some discontented and evil disposed individuals have originated in the 1st Battalion of the 3d Regt. of Guards, it is still a satisfaction to reflect, and it is with pride that His Royal Highness indulges the feeling, that the discipline of other Regiments of Guards remains firm in a knowledge of what is due to discipline and authority; and that they are incapable of harboring their high character for a reputation in discontents, which are equally trifious as they are groundless.

Or let it be read at the head of every Regiment and in the Army, and entered in the Orders Book.
