I am now 23 years—I came into Limerick I have supported what is of more value to my reputation—and I call on Mr. R. Maunsell, Mr. Hastings, to state his objections to me, and have done, that induces him to withhold his name as a Trustee. (Loud Cheering, and Applause.)

Mr. Chairman, I never entertained a doubt of the respectability of Mr. White, but as I had not the pleasure of being subjected to his nomination. At the express relative, G. Maunsell, I invited Mr. White, the third Trustee, Mr. Brown declined, and Mr. Nugent is now proposed.
