DIED—On Friday last, at his Palace, in Chelsea, after a long illness, the Hon. Browlow North, D. C. L. Lord Bishop of Winchester, Prelate of the Order of the Garter, Provincial Sub-Dean of Canterbury, and Visitor of Magdalen Hall, Trinity, St. John's, and Corpus Colleges, Oxford, F. A. and L. S. His Lordship was aged 79, having been nearly 45 years Bishop of Winchester. The virtues of Christianity grafted upon his singularly mild and indulgent disposition, formed a character whose loss is truly afflictive to his family and friends—Drowned, whilst bathing near Waterloo Bridge, London, James Frederick Kirkup, Esq.—At Drim, near Quin, Co. Clare, in the 84th year of his age, the Rev. John Hogan, of the Order of St. Francis—At Montauban, in the South of France, the Rev. Donnelly Conne, eldest son of the late Connolly Conne, Esq. of Bath, and of Sullychannon Co. Leitrim—In Lupton, on Thursday last, aged 78, John Anderson, Esq. late of Fermoy, in the Co. Cork, and father to Sir James Anderson, Bart. This is not the time or place for us to enter into any description of the public or private character of this Gentleman; all we shall say is, that his public spirit rendered the most essential service to Ireland, by the establishment of Mail Coaches; and accelerating the communication between Dublin and Cork, by which means a journey is effected in twenty-four hours which heretofore took up from four days to a week. He was a man of most extraordinary qualities and great strength of mind, with a ready and quick conception of any subject he undertook to execute—Of a rapid decline, Mr. Anthony Murray, of Bow-street, Dublin.
