

girl, gave witness three ten-pennies out of her purse, with fringe of lace attached to it, in description of the one seen by Guerin, (said prisoner); as witness getting the ten-pennies, perhaps, you want a little change." Witness as to the size of the purse which was taken from his pantaloons, and corroborated his description of its size and appearance. Witness (an Irish witness) lives in Limerick. Witness on Arthur's quay; saw the prisoner at this age, in company with Mr. S. they both were there; they were twice there; they did not pay a link with her as a pledge; witness identified her as the one which they brought to her from her place, when Mr. S. was tried a messenger from the Knight of Glin; the Mr. S. they paid three pence each for their wine if they slept together; a girl did not see it at night.

Witness, again called up, and asked by the other the young woman, deceased, worn on the articles produced on the table, when in company with "Yes, my Lord, she wore a kerchief." Witness to the deceased—knew Ellen Hanly, who was living with him since she was six or seven up to the period of her elopement with Mr. S. then about fifteen; was a very pretty girl, in her upper gums, at each side of her teeth which projected; deceased left witness on the day of June, 1813, whilst he was never married; his niece took £100 in notes in gold, since which time he never saw her; she six weeks after.

Witness—Lives at Moypoint, within three miles of the County Clare side; recollects the witness and John Driscoll went out early in the morning to see a dead body on the strand, examined the body, with a rope round the neck, and the body was naked, with the hair on it; one of her hands was off and the witness examined the strand for her and the rope was then produced to witness, and as that which was round the deceased's neck, and called out for Driscoll to assist him to bury the body, as the pigs or dogs would tear it; it was buried in a hole; witness reported the circumstances; the Knight of Glin, Major O'Sullivan and other persons, came there; witness was the deceased was taken up; on burying her, he covered it with sea-wood; knew Ellen Walsh, and heard her say that the teeth projecting out of her upper gums; the teeth were in the head; [here there was a variation—Walsh swore that the teeth were not in the head, but the holes were there.]

Witness examined.—Is a Magistrate of the County of the murder of Ellen Hanly, on the 1st of 1810, and of the finding of the body; quickly recollects the place where the body was interred; Ellen Walsh in a description of the person of the deceased, and minutely her clothes to him, previous to the body; Ellen Walsh mentioned to witness, that the teeth projecting out of the upper gums of the deceased were the same person; witness swore as to the body being taken up; the body was examined by witness, and saw the rope tight round the neck; the projecting teeth were in the head, the sockets were evident which were pointed out to each of which properly corroborated. Ellen Walsh's body appeared swelled; one arm was off, and broken; Ellen Walsh then looked at the body; witness particular of the clothes; on the strand amount of a tub; the body was entirely covered; witness described the clothes previous to the body; witness got some of the clothes from the woman with whom Mr. S. lodged; got the prisoner's sister, who returned from Kerry, at her house; [here the Knight of Glin recog-

the commission of this diabolical act, you have received no provocation; but you have been the willing instrument in gratifying the lust of your wretched Master.

His Lordship then pronounced sentence of Death on the prisoner, and ordered him for Execution on Thursday, (to-morrow) — While his Lordship was addressing the prisoner, he exclaimed, "a long day my Lord." During the trial, the prisoner's countenance underwent no alteration, till towards the close of it, he seemed to feel that all was over with him—he is a well-looking man, good size, and appears to be about 28 years of age.—The Court was crowded to excess by persons of the first respectability, to hear the development of a murder so mysterious in its perpetration.
