*Horse-Guards, July 6, 1829.*

The Commander-in-Chief has had occasion to notice the irregular practice adopted in several instances, by the Officers of the Army, of wearing plain clothes at their Regimental Quarters, and this irregularity having caused a serious obstruction to discipline upon a particular and recent occasion, in a Regiment of Cavalry, stationed in the North of England, his Royal Highness deems it essential to enjoin Officers commanding Districts and Regiments, to take special care, that no Officers under their command shall ever appear at their quarters without their uniform. — By command of his Royal Highness the Commander-in-Chief,

After some pause, the unhappy man said, the neglect of his religious duties which led him to the sin of this act; for had he studied by the example of the Clergy, he would not meet this unhappy end—his example, to all who saw and heard him, a sufficient warning to attend to their religious duties. He continued to pray most fervently, hoping great God would forgive him his sins—wrote the last moving, he yielded to the rope, and fell gently off, distinctly saying, "the Lord be merciful to me." He died without the appearance of agonizing, and after hanging the time prescribed, was cut down, his body conveyed to the County Hospital for dissection. After his conviction on Tuesday, he made a full admission of his guilt in the jail, in presence of many, and described the mode of his destruction. When he was about the centre of the river, he stood up, a musket in his hand, with which he made a bid for his head, but having missed, struck her in the arm, which was broken—he then beat her with the gun till she fell dead, and afterwards tied her right leg to her neck, a large stone was attached, and flung the body into the river, which sunk immediately.

### THE MASQUERADE

The Masquerade at the New Theatre on Thursday last, was very numerously attended. The Theatre was up in the best style. The pit was entirely boarded up with the stage a platform of 75 feet in length, which was most tastefully and elegantly decorated with green, artificial flowers and flowering shrubs, and illuminated with wax lights, wreaths of variegated Egyptian lanterns.

(as Scotch admirably supported), Mr. A. C. &c. &c. As military officer, Mr. L. in half-regimental and half-coloured clothes, an excellent character. Mr. J. F. was completely the character of a Foot, as was Mr. W. Mr. D. B. an imitator of Dick's practice. Mr. T. as the wife of Sylvester, afforded great amusement to the party. Mr. S. supported the character of a man who had just returned from the East, in his wretched style of dress, and hissing bills for Mr. Armstrong's Bazaar; Mr. M. that of a mad player, with great effect. — Gentlemen were in constant collision, and afforded great amusement, by sporting several passages from the works of Shakespeare's plays. — Mr. B. as a Green. Mr. F. a grey-headed pipistrelle. Mr. B. as an excellent character. Several of the characters were changed during the night, amongst which we remarked Mr. B. as an excellent Jersey Dick, a woman, disposed of his wares in a good style, and fully in character.
