Waterford Markets on Saturday.

There has been scarcely any alteration in the price of Waterford corn but, first quality having remained, for the last two days, tolerably steady, at 3*1/2*s, generally, though 3*1/2* to 4*1/2*d. over has been paid in a few instances. The supply at the crane on both days was nearly equal—Thursday, 34*1/2*; yesterday, 36*1/2* firkins. The business done in Corn this week has been but limited, but the dullness was very perceptibly increased in the latter part of yesterday. Some very prime Wheat was bought at 3*3/4*, 4*1/2*d. in the morning; but subsequently 3*3/4* was as much as could be obtained, and inferior samples would not bring over 3*1/2*d. Oats may still be quoted at 1*1/2*s, 2*1/2*d. to 1*1/2*s, 5*1/2*d. the latter not being fair in
