LIMERICK SATURDAY, SEPTEMBER 9.

The Provest Dublin, who is appointed Lord
Bishop of Limerick, will arrive here on Wed-
nesday. The Provost is to be succeeded by
Doctor Miller, Master of Enniskillen School.

The Hon. Bar George has arrived on a visit
to his son-in-law, this City.

Lord Exmouth has completed his three years
service as Commander in Chief at Plymouth, and
will be succeeded Admiral the Hon Sir Alex-
ander Inglis Cotter, a Knight Grand Cross of
the Order of the Bath.

Wednesday Head Quarter Division of the
2d Royal Welsh Battalion, under the command
of Major Boult, disembarked at Cove, and
immediately made for Middleton, en route to
Fermanagh, there sent orders from the Commander
of the Forces. This fine Regiment is destined to
have its headquarters at Waterford, and to take up
the cantonments of the 35th.

The 12th Regiment of Foot are daily expected
to land at Liverpool from Ireland. The 1st, or
Royal Dragoons disembarked there last week,
under the command of Colonel Clifton, and are
now doing duty Manchester. The 12th Foot
are to be quartered York, Leeds, and Hudders-

field. Saturday, a son of the 80th Regiment left
Edinburgh Castle on his march to Berwick. The
80th is to be replaced by the 13th, from Stirling
Castle.

The native force of India is to be augmented by
the addition of Regiments; the prize-money
is still in abeyance owing to a misunderstanding
between the claimants.

Wednesday night, the Masked Ball at
Swindon's was so numerously attended as
expected, there being 50 in the rooms, and
very few chairs appeared.—Supper was
prepared for nearly 100.

A public entertainment was given by the friends
of Independence Thomas Spring Rice, Esq.
M. P. of this City Moriarthy's, on Thursday.

The following account of a most disgraceful
outrage committed in this neighbourhood was
handed us this day for insertion:—

On Friday last as the Rev. Joseph Jones was proceeding
with his steward and another person, to ascertain the value
of tithes in that part of Cregga called Roota, in the Liberties
of this City, he was instantly pursued and surrounded by
a mob, armed with stones and clubs. Mr. Jones's steward
was knocked down, and but for the interference of a woman
more humane than the rest, would have been murdered.—
Mr. Jones was also knocked down by a stroke of a stone in
the temple, and both have been much injured and wounded.
The Rev. Mr. Garsten having seen the crowd assembling
from all quarters of the country, and suspecting the cause,
instantly repaired to the spot, and remonstrating with the
people, was assailed by several stones thrown at him, and
but for the swiftness of his horse, would have had serious
injury. On coming to his own house, through a dangerous
bog, he armed himself and soon returned with the Rev.
William Lloyd, accompanied by a few of Mr. Lloyd's
tenants, and rescued Mr. Jones and valuator from their
perilous state. Great praise is due to Captain Rose, who,
on hearing of Mr. Jones's situation, ordered the party of
Police at Patrick's-well, to afford Mr. Jones their protection,
but he was then safely lodged in Mr. Garsten's house.
Mr. Jones declined the use of Major Going's Police in the
first instance, conceiving that from his usual lenity in collecting
his tithes, and his complying with every wish of the
Parishioners his own presence would render any such hostile
appearance unnecessary; besides they could not act in that
part of the Country, within the Liberties, how the most
disturbed.—As another man of Mr. Jones's a few days before
was passing quietly through another part of the parish in the
County, he was followed by a number of men, and owes his
safety to the protection of Mr. Peacock's house, of Donegal,
which with great difficulty he reached before the party could
come upon him.

The Widow Farrell, with two unfortunate children; left
her by her husband, who, in a state of great distress, cut
