VERY LATE FROM LISBON.

Cork Southern Reporter Office,
4 o'Clock, Tuesday.

"The *Lively Ann*, arrived in this river
last night in seven days from Oporto, by which
we have Papers from thence to the 8th inst., and
from Lisbon to the 29th ult. The Juntas of
Oporto and Lisbon had formed a Coalition for
carrying on the public affairs, till the Cortes
assembled; which was to be convoked with all
possible dispatch, when the Juntas would be
dissolved."

On Sunday night, Lieut. Thomas Long, half-
pay 58th Regiment, was murdered in the street of
Ballina, Co. Mayo. The perpetrators are four
labourers and two women.

Sunday morning last, the body of a man named
James Ryan, was found lying on the beach at the

committed to gaol for four months, by order of
Sir David Perrier.

ADDRESS FROM THE CLERGY OF THE DIOCESE OF ARDFERT AND AGHA TO THE LORD BISHOP OF CLOYNE.

My Lord.

Your Lordship's recent translation having reminded
the State of this united Diocese, upon your appointment
superintendence, we, the Clergy of Ardfert and Agha,
deeply impressed with a sense of the advantages to Religion
to our Church Establishment, and to ourselves, of
that measure has been so productive, beg leave to
your Lordship's removal, by his expression of our res-
pect.

In every district of this extensive and remote Diocese
many Churches have been erected with an anxious view
for the convenience of the inhabitants as well as the
service of Religion. Glebes have been purchased and
built thereon, whereby our personal comforts have been
sustained, and our local influence widely extended; while
great and paramount objects of our Ministry have
facilitated, and the security and well-being of the Esta-
ment promoted by the formation of a society for the
distribution of the Holy Scriptures, accompanied by
Prayer Books and Religious Tracts. And though
rejoice in the prospect of an extension of those blessings
to others; from your Lordship's translation, yet cannot
this consciousness reconcile us to a separation from
you so long, so much, and so deservedly respected.

We venture not, therefore, to indulge in any expres-
sion of feelings upon your Lordship's removal, after an
course of fifteen years, but shall content ourselves with
assurance (simple as sincere) of gratitude for that su-
temper and amity of disposition, (so consonant with
Episcopal character,) by which our applications had
all times received, and our wants and accommodations
unfrequently anticipated.
